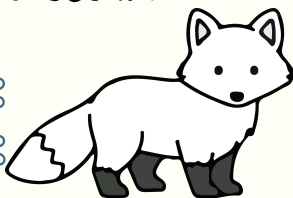
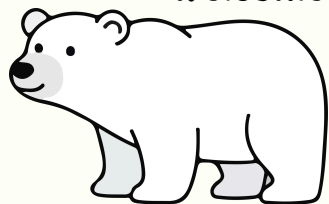

LABELLING

Benefits of Reading

1. Language Development

- Regular reading exposes children to new vocabulary, sentence structures, and sounds, which strengthens their language skills.
- It helps them understand how words connect to meaning, improving comprehension and communication.



3. Emotional Bonding

- Shared reading time creates a sense of security and strengthens the parent-child relationship.
- It provides opportunities for comfort and positive interaction, which is essential for emotional well-being.

2. Cognitive Growth

- Listening to stories stimulates imagination and creativity.
- It builds memory, attention span, and problem-solving skills as children follow plots and anticipate outcomes.

4. Early Literacy Skills

- Children learn how books work (left-to-right reading, turning pages) and begin recognizing letters and sounds.
- These foundational skills make the transition to independent reading smoother.
