

RE Curriculum Overview







Our Approach

We follow the **Blackburn Diocesan Board of Education Syllabus** which is called **Questful RE**. Our **cyclical** curriculum focuses on the 3 aspects below and our pupils develop their knowledge and understanding through the themes of **homes & families**, **stories & celebrations** and **neighbours & communities**, where they go on a quest to find the answers. Each time they revisit an aspect within a theme, it is with **increasing complexity** and **deeper reflection** to build on their **prior knowledge**.

	Give pupils an understanding that they are unique and special. To know that Christians believe that they are loved, valued and made by God. EYFS 2: Why do people of faith say thankyou to God at Harvest time? Give pupils an understanding of why Christians say thank you to God at harvest time and talk about him being creator.	 Explore the nativity story in a variety of ways and ensure pupils know that Christmas is the celebration of Jesus' birth. Unit 1.3: Why do we give and receive gifts? Deepen the children's understanding of the true meaning of Christmas through emphasising that Jesus was a gift from God. Discuss the thoughts and feelings associated with giving and receiving gifts. 	 Introduce pupils to stories of the Old Testament and understand that Jesus would have heard these stories as he was growing up. Explore the stories that Jesus told and know that he told them to teach us about God. 	 Explore the events of Easter through a variety of multisensory experiences ensuring that pupils know that for Christians it is a celebration of Jesus' death and resurrection. Enable pupils to begin to understand that Christians believe that Jesus died because he loves us and that he came back to life to save us and mend the relationship with God that was broken at the Fall. (God's Big Story) 	 Explore the meaning of friendship, how we make friends and why friends are important. Know about Jesus making friends, how he made friends and who he chose EYFS 10: What is prayer? Start children on their journey towards understanding what prayer is and the different ways people of faith talk to God. 	 Develop pupils understanding of special/holy times. Increasing their knowledge of the ways special times are celebrated, remembered and the reasons why. Introduce pupils to the story of Pentecost and God as Holy Spirit. Begin to develop pupils' knowledge of the festivate celebrated by people of faith.

Introduce pupils to the Christian belief that Jesus will return (the second coming). 	 Identify the links between the Passover meal, Last Supper and Eucharist. Develop pupils' understanding of the Eucharist and the symbolism connected with it. Develop pupils' understanding of the importance of the Eucharist and why it is celebrated. 	Allow children the opportunity to stand back and consider 'Who was Jesus?' and 'Who is Jesus?' from their own point of view and the views of others in the past and today.
